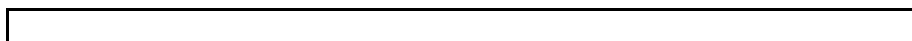

**Discussion:** Mr. Delmagori presented the staff report. Mr. Delmagori said the Technical Committee needs to look at project information to see if it is correct. The Technical Committee also needs to review the list of new projects and rank according to the MTP criteria. After the Technical Committee has completed the ranking and review the TIP will be advertised for 30 days for public review and input.

Mr. Christensen said the projects need to be ranked on regional significance. Mr. Lucero agreed and added that the roads should be at least regional collectors.

Mr. Delmagori asked for the status of the City of Aztec airport projects. Mr. Christensen said the maintenance project would be on-going and the other project would be completed fairly soon.

Mr. Delmagori asked what the status of the projects on page 37 was, which included the East Arterial, South Oliver, and Oliver/McWilliams. Mr. Christensen said the North Oliver project was an MAP project.

Mr. Delmagori asked for the status of the City of Bloomfield West Blanco Blvd. Phase 3 project. Mr. Steinmetz said the project would be completed by this summer. Mr. Delmagori said the project could be removed from the TIP since it would be finished prior to the new fiscal year.

Mr. Delmagori asked if the East Main and Pinon Hills Boulevard project on page 42 was good. Mr. Lucero said it would be up to the EPA because they may want an expansion bridge. If the City of Farmington does not get some variance on the bridge and the EPA asks for the expansion bridge, the project will be dead. Mr. Delmagori said the TIP would keep the project on with the numbers Ms. Westerling had provided.

Mr. Delmagori asked if the Hutton/Main safety project would be kept. Mr. Lucero said the City of Farmington safety project may need to be moved back a year or moved to a sidewalk project at Piedra Vista. Mr. Delmagori said he would contact Ms. Westerling regarding the project. Mr. Lucero said the current safety project doesn't have much done except for some preliminary engineering.

Mr. Delmagori asked if County Road 6675 project was done. Mr. Keck said it would be done by the calendar year. Mr. Keck said the county needs to have the Chaco Project on the TIP. Mr. Delmagori said it was on page 55 and is listed in the non-regionally significant list because of the location of the project.

Mr. Delmagori asked if the non-regionally significant section of the TIP had any changes. Mr. Christensen said that South Oliver needs to be moved to the unfunded list. Mr. Delmagori said the project was in the regionally significant list. Mr. Christensen said there is expected funding and hopefully something with the county will be worked out. Mr. Keck said Mr. Marcum at the county wants to work with the City of Aztec to come up with some agreement on the project. Mr. Delmagori asked if the project needed to stay on the TIP. Mr. Christensen and Mr. Keck both said it needed to stay on the TIP.

Mr. Christensen asked if the intersection at the Old Aztec Highway and Lakewood was still going to happen. Mr. Lucero said the City of Farmington would like the project to happen, but is waiting on the NMDOT to decide where the Old Aztec Highway access would be. Mr. Lucero added the City of Farmington would not be working on the road until then because the City did not want a misaligned intersection as the road would be a large north south collector. Mr. Delmagori said the City of Farmington and NMDOT have been working on the project.

Mr. Christensen asked if the NMDOT was working on a way to implement fees on developers when a major thoroughfare would be impacted. Mr. Lucero said the City of Farmington was working on an impact fee. Mr. Christensen said the City of Aztec was also working on an impact fee but he would like to see a regional fee set. Mr. Lucero said the County would need to be the collector of fees outside the entity limits.

Mr. Steinmetz said the dollar value on the Saiz Lane project was wrong; it is listed at \$380,000 and an additional \$1 million should be added. Mr. Delmagori said he would fix the error.

Mr. Keck asked if the Technical Committee could make a motion to accept the ranking as presented. Mr. Delmagori said if the Technical Committee agreed that would be fine and the projects would be ranked as presented.

**Action:** Mr. Christensen made a motion and Mr. Steinmetz seconded the motion to keep the TIP priority list ranked as presented. The motion passed unanimously.

**BACKGROUND or PREVIOUS WORK**

- The Technical and Policy Committees have reviewed the list of proposed walking and biking projects, evaluation criteria and policies.
- The Technical Committee has recommended Policy Committee approval of the walking and biking policies and evaluation criteria for prioritizing projects.
- The Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Group (BPAG) has gone through the second and third iterations of selecting draft lists of the top 20-30 priority projects at the January 29 and February 19 meetings, respectively.

**CURRENT WORK**

- Develop draft lists and maps of walking and biking projects for the MPO region and for local projects in Aztec, Bloomfield, and Farmington.
- Refinement of cost estimates for proposed projects.

**ANTICIPATED WORK**

- Development of bicycle/pedestrian standards for all road classifications as well as for new commercial and residential developments.
- Work with entity staff to evaluate and prioritize projects:
  1. Into short, medium, and long range lists; and,
  2. Into MPO region and entity-specific lists

**BACKUP MATERIAL**

- BPAG list of walking and biking improvements with voting results.
- Draft of MPO regional list of walking and biking projects.
- Draft map of pedestrian and bicycle networks for the MPO region. Large maps

will be available at the meeting for review.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Technical Committee review the draft list and maps of MPO regional walking and biking improvements and suggest revisions/deletions/additions to the list.

**Discussion:** Mr. Messenger presented the staff report and said both committees have reviewed the list. The MPO now has a draft map of regional routes, which is a selection of projects from the overall improvement list. Regional projects are being defined as those that connect cities or get someone through a city. Mr. Messenger said that one project the BPAG would like to see done is to have the old railroad right-of-way on Scott Avenue turned into a bicycle/walking path and to extend the river trail to connect Berg Park. Another project is the Sunrise Parkway project from Butler to Sunrise. Mr. Lucero said the Vista del Arroyo is an actual park which may be important to the Sunrise Parkway project. Mr. Messenger asked if Panther Trail will be part of the park. Mr. Lucero said it could be a part of a system in that area of town if there is funding.

Mr. Christensen asked how the BPAG ranked the projects. Mr. Messenger said if the project received 4 votes or more it was put on the project list. Mr. Messenger said the river trail projects received many votes.

Mr. Lucero asked what the cost was based on. Mr. Messenger said the cost was only the construction cost, not the cost of right-of-way or design costs.

Mr. Messenger then presented other projects including the Ruins Road trail, the BLM trails, a trail along the La Plata River to Jackson Lake and Gateway Park to Farmington Lake.

Mr. Messenger asked if the Technical Committee felt the projects were good projects to move forward. Mr. Lucero said the MPO has done a good job balancing out the entity projects and the list looked good.

Mr. Christensen said the Alien Bike Trail in Aztec is not on the list. Mr. Messenger said it was not brought up but could be added. Mr. Christensen said it would be both a County and City trail. Mr. Delmagori asked if the trail already exists. Mr. Christensen said yes but it needs to be greatly improved.

Mr. Keck asked if there was anything else on the bicycle/pedestrian plan that needed to be discussed. Mr. Delmagori said the plan would include regional projects and the MPO will focus on those regional projects. Mr. Lucero asked how many projects there are. Mr. Messenger said there are approximately 40 total projects.

#### BACKGROUND or PREVIOUS WORK

- Access Management policies have been finalized with the Technical Committee.
- Definitions and functions for eight road classifications and their respective typical road sections have been completed.
- Standards and objectives to support the policies have been identified.

#### CURRENT WORK

- Typical urban and rural road sections are provided for review.
- Spacing standards will be discussed by the Technical Committee.

#### ANTICIPATED WORK

- Continue development of standard driveway and intersection spacing and corner clearance.
- Access management standards for medians.

#### BACKUP MATERIAL

- Policies and supporting standards.
- Draft urban and rural road section diagrams.
- NMDOT intersection spacing standards
- Intersection spacing guidelines from TRB.
- Comparison of intersection spacing standards from other MPOs and DOTs.

#### RECOMMENDATION

- It is recommended that the Technical Committee develop intersection, driveway, and corner clearance spacing standards for access management.

**Discussion:** Mr. Delmagori presented the road section criteria summary, the placeholder table for the intersection access specifications and the road sections previously discussed with the Technical Committee.

Mr. Christensen asked if the Access Management Plan was passed if the roads would need to be built as shown, because on North Oliver there will need to be some changes. Mr. Christensen added that on North Oliver having the bike lanes next to the road would be nearly impossible to do and only experienced bikers would ride next to the traffic. Mr. Christensen said the City of Aztec wants to have the bike and pedestrian lane located on a separate path on North Oliver. Mr. Messenger said the AMP is asking that the proper right-of-way be obtained for new roads. Mr. Lucero said on page 81 there is an illustration of the type of road design Mr. Christensen was

looking for. Mr. Lucero also said the road design is a suggestion and the design can be manipulated as long as the proper right-of-way is available.

Mr. Christensen said he was definitely more interested in bike paths instead of bike lanes on heavily trafficked roads. Mr. Delmagori said the AMP is a guide to building future roads and the designs can be road specific and side-paths can be incorporated. Mr. Lucero said with a 100 foot right-of-way there should be enough room to have a buffer and be able to meet the criteria of the plan. Mr. Lucero said that separate bicycle/pedestrian paths would be very expensive.

Mr. Christensen asked if wording could be added to say that roads could have safe bicycle/pedestrian routes not adjacent to the road. Mr. Messenger said it is in the policies already which also say bicycle/pedestrian facilities are to be provided with the roads when possible.

Mr. Christensen said he would like to see these policies on new roads and the developers need to have explicit policies or they will do the bare minimum.

Mr. Keck said during a meeting the state held Ms. Faught said the funding for roads is going to be decreased and some roads will go back to being dirt roads due to the lack of maintenance funding. Mr. Keck said he did not know how the County would be able to pay for the types of cross-sections the AMP calls for and many developers will confront the County about not being able to develop land because of the cost of the roads. Mr. Christensen said he would have the same problems in the City of Aztec. Mr. Steinmetz said the plan would be hard for the City of Bloomfield to implement also. Mr. Keck added that the County Commission will have a hard time passing the AMP.

Mr. Keck said that if the county gets the full right-of-way for roads with that width then people will start to speed along the roads. Mr. Keck said another issue is the cost to developers for roads that won't ever serve enough traffic to justify the rights-of-way. Mr. Keck said many of the criteria can't be met by the entities or developers at this time and could become like the County's speed hump policy. Mr. Messenger suggested the policy be looked at for routes to schools and parks.

Mr. Keck said no one knows what the future is going to hold and unless the state or earmarks come through for the entities the roads are probably going to slide backwards. Mr. Keck said the developers and entities can only put up so much funding for roads. Mr. Delmagori said the road sections can be configured differently. Mr. Lucero said the construction of the roads could be a mix and match of the road sections in the AMP, but he said only so much can be done and one way to start is to make sure the entities get enough right-of-way now.

Dr. Widoe said the entities will need to buy off on the plan that is best for all possible worlds. Dr. Widoe said that if the standards are not met then this will increase the budget drastically and it will cause problems. Dr. Widoe added the standards and criteria can be modified if something needs to change. Dr. Widoe advised the standards and criteria should be doable for the entities and the developers because if the plan is adopted but not enforced it will cause legal problems for the entities. Mr. Keck said the county already has that problem with the guard rail policies, and the

cost of building guardrails to specifications is too high so it is easier for the county to not build guard rails.

Mr. Keck said when this plan is presented to the Policy Committee it needs to be fully explained to them. Mr. Lucero said it may be a good idea if the planners of the entities really go over the plan and then have those options in the plan as well.

**BACKGROUND or PREVIOUS WORK**

- Farmington routes surpassed 101,300 riders in 2007.
- Riders on regional routes from Farmington totaled nearly 6,800.
- Ridership increased in January after small decreases in previous months.

**RECOMMENDATION**

- It is recommended that the Technical Committee receive a report on Red Apple Transit.

**Discussion:** Mr. Delmagori presented the report he received from Mr. Hunt to the Technical Committee.

**10. NMDOT**

**Discussion:** Dr. Bob Wideo gave an update on GRIP II. The New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) originally did a conservative estimate of bonding capacity. After reviewing the original estimate, the NMFA determined that there is an additional 3 million dollars in bonding capacity. The NMFA will sell the remainder of 2008 bonds in June. Only 12 million dollars is available for 2009 that has not already been obligated and there are 69 entities competing for this amount.

Dr. Wideo said August 15 is the drop dead date for project certification and the entities need to make sure all their certifications are in by that day. The projects will not be able to roll over this year. Dr. Wideo said it was not a good scenario for

funding. Dr. Wideo said funding for District 5 had been \$27 million two years ago and is down to \$19 million this year.

Dr. Wideo said the state had not received any Safe Routes to School applications from the entities in the MPO area.

Dr. Wideo said the NWNMCOG is planning on holding town hall meetings to discuss HM35. On May 14 and 15, the Bicycle Pedestrian Equestrian (BPE) advisory group will hold their next quarterly meeting in Aztec.

The Local Transportation Assistance Program (LTAP) has software training and other training opportunities available.

Regarding the local government road program, the NWNMCOG is asking the NMDOT to go back to having a 2-year cycle so there is enough money to complete the projects.

Dr. Wideo said the NWRPO will be holding their April meeting at the Navajo Nation DOT in Window Rock and then in San Juan County in June. Dr. Wideo suggested the MPO meet with the NWRPO in June.

Dr. Wideo said he has been contacted by Jose Ortiz and Sal Soto about presentations regarding ADA and Civil Rights issues.

**BACKGROUND or PREVIOUS WORK**

- Staff completed the process of collecting and assigning socioeconomic data to update the base (from 2003 to 2005) and forecast (2030) years in the Regional Travel Model.
- Staff assigned data on new residential and commercial permits for 2004 and 2005 from San Juan County (includes Aztec and Bloomfield) and Farmington to their TAZ.
- School enrollment and employment numbers have been assigned to TAZ.
- Collection, analysis, and assignment of employment data from the oil and gas industry to TAZ.
- Collection, analysis, and assignment of major employer data to TAZ.
- PTV was contracted to update and expand the travel model for the MPO.

**CURRENT WORK**

- In communication and participating in tutorials with PTV America.
- Providing the consultant with traffic count data and the updated land use data for 2005 and 2030.

**ANTICIPATED WORK**

- PTV will begin to calibrate/validate and expand the model to have AM Peak Hour and Daily capabilities (3 month process).
- Work with entities to develop a mid-forecast year (~2012) based on updated base year data.

**INFORMATION ITEMS**

- g. New Ozone Standards.** EPA has issued the final rule on the new ozone standards. The primary 8-hour standard went from 0.08 parts per million

units of air (ppm) to 0.075. Stations in San Juan County show this area is at 0.070 ppb. More information is attached.

- h. Safe Routes to School Webseminar.** On March 18, staff attended a webseminar that described how to start a SRTS program with zero funding. Steps included assembling partners, gathering volunteers, and working with the media to promote the event. It described some strategies for implementing and sustaining the program.
